## **Program Mission Statement**

**Mission:** Overcome justice involvement to achieve housing stability.

**Vision:** Every Veteran experiencing active justice involvement has access to housing.



#### MACV Program Services

 Pre-Release Housing Planning: Create prerelease plans in coordination with the DOC case managers for Veterans who are expected to be released into housing instability.

Post-Release Case Management: Support
 Veterans in maintaining compliance with
 conditions of release and parole, including
 coordinating and communicating with the parole
 officer.

 Internal Case Consulting: Advise MACV Case management staff as they encounter justice involvement issues with existing clients.



## Program Goals

- Prevent technical violations by assisting Veterans with navigating their conditions of release
- Ensure Veterans have housing options upon release through connection to housing, employment, and legal services
- Reduce long-term and chronic homelessness for Veterans with justice involvement histories



# Common Technical Violations

- Missing required appointments
- Lack of contact with parole officers
- Not registering a physical address
- Failure to pay court fees
- Failure to attend treatment/programming



#### How Homelessness Contributes to Technical Violations

- Lack of transportation for required appointments
- Lack of contact with parole officers due to not having cell phones
- Living on the streets and being unable to register an address
- Lack of income or connection to services leading to an inability to pay for required treatment/program fees or electronic monitoring



# How MACV Mitigates Technical Violations and Reincarceration

- Providing Uber transportation to their required legal appointments
- Providing them with cell phones for communication
- Providing them a physical address on their release date
- Paying for required electronic phone monitoring
- Paying any out-of-pocket program/treatment fees



#### Community Partner Roles

#### **Healthcare Re-entry for Veterans (VA):**

- GPD Referrals (Salvation Army and 47)
- St. Cloud VA RRTP
- HUDVASH

#### **Prison Outreach Program (MDVA):**

- "Turn off" and "Turn on" VA disability benefits
- Provide information on applying for retirement benefits and discharge upgrades
- Submits VA disability claims

#### **MACV**

- SSVF (Housing, Healthcare Navigation, Legal, Landlord Engagement, Shallow Subsidy)
- HVRP (Employment)
- GPD



# Statistics, Trends, and Costs

- \$41,366/year to keep someone incarcerated in Minnesota
- In 2018, 88% of individuals under supervision in Minnesota were reincarcerated for minor technical violations
- In the last 2 years, MACV has had 3
   Veterans become reincarcerated due to a technical violation
